
MESSAGE FROM FATHER ARTHUR

Parish Council

The Parish Council is a group of parishioners who work together with the Pastor in an advisory capacity to make decisions for the good of the Parish. They also represent their fellow parishioners. Parish Council members are registered members of Sacred Heart-St. Mary's who are active in practicing their Faith, and able to attend monthly Parish council meetings.

Liturgical Ministers



Liturgical Ministers are lay people who take leadership roles in the celebration of our Parish Liturgies. Serving as a liturgical minister is a calling that enriches not only the Assembly of the Faithful, but also each person who makes the decision to answer that call.

- Lectors proclaim the Holy Scriptures at Mass—usually the First and Second Readings—and may also offer the prayers of the Faithful. They assist the people to hear God speaking to them in the Scriptures.
- **Eucharistic Ministers** are designated Parishioners who assist with the distribution of Communion at Mass in the forms of both bread and wine—the precious Body and Blood of Christ.
- Music Ministers offer their musical talents for leading the assembly in sung prayer. They may serve as accompanists, instrumentalists, cantors or choir members.
- **Ushers** assist in seating parishioners, gathering the collection, facilitating the communion procession, and helping everyone to comfortably participate in the liturgies.
- ◆ Altar Servers assist the priest and other ministers in the celebration of the Eucharist. They lead the procession into Church with the cross and candles; they help the priest as book-bearer for the Prayers, and they assist at the altar as needed.
- Liturgy Committee meets to discuss plans for the Liturgical Seasons of the Church Year. After being trained, they serve as Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers and Altar assistants to Fr. Arthur at the 12:10 weekday Masses and Tues. Adoration. On special days the Liturgy Committee assists Father at the 12:10 Mass with the distribution of Ashes, Blessing of Throats, and other such duties.

ADULT RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Bible Study is offered to interested adults.

—One study takes place every Thursday morning from 9:30-11:00 AM.

—An evening Bible study is offered on Mondays from 6:30-8:00 PM, for six weeks in the Fall and six weeks during Lent.

RCIA (The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults)

is a process by which individuals are initiated into the Catholic Faith. In this process, informal learning sessions are held for adults and children ages seven and older who have never been Baptized, who were Baptized in other Faiths and wish to become Catholic; who were Baptized Catholic, but never completed the Sacraments, including Eucharist and/or Confirmation. Catholics who would like a "refresher" course are also most welcome to attend.

The process begins whenever you are ready, and classes are tailored to your schedule. Anyone interested should contact **Terry Streit** at 315-939-3485.



PASTORAL CARE TEAM

Members of our newly formed PASTORAL CARE TEAM visit and often bring Communion to our Parishioners who are homebound, in hospitals or in Nursing Homes. They bring the healing presence of Christ as they spend time with the sick, the shut-ins and elderly. They are our Parish's representatives sharing Holy Communion and our companionship. It is very important that those who are no longer able to be with us on Sunday know that they are still linked to us, and that they are valued members of our Parish Community.

This is more than a volunteer job. It is a call, a ministry, a vocation. Jesus visits the sick or elderly person in us, and we in turn see the suffering Jesus in each person we visit. Anyone who is interested in being a visitor should call

HOPE HOUSE

Located on Eagle Street in Utica, Hope House provides meals to those in need 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

Volunteers from our Parish have been serving meals there on the 1st Thursday of the month for a number of years. This year we also began preparing the meals that our volunteers will be serving. Many of our pa-



rishioners who are unable to volunteer also help by their financial assistance that helps to purchase the food that we prepare and serve. A \$2.00 donation is usually enough to feed one of Hope House's guests for a day.

HILLTOP SENIORS

LEGION OF MARY

The object of the Legion of Mary is the glory of God through the holiness of its members developed by prayer and active co-operation in Mary's and the Church's work. The unit of the Legion of Mary is called a presidium, which holds a weekly meeting, where prayer is intermingled with reports and discussion. Sacred Heart-St. Mary's Legion meets on *Mondays at 1:00 PM in the Cow Palace*.

The Legion sees as its priority the spiritual and social welfare of each individual. The members participate in the life of the parish through visitation of families, the sick, both in their homes and in hospitals and Nursing Homes. New members are always welcome! SACRED HEART/ROSARY SOCIETY

This Society was founded in 1910, the same year St Mary, Our Lady of Czestohowa was established. One of its purposes is to foster an ardent devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Our Lady of the Rosary. This is accomplished by attending devotions to the Sacred Heart of Jesus whose Feast Day is in June; and honoring Mary, the Mother of the Rosary, whose Feast is in October.

The Society also functions as a bereavement group. A Mass is offered for each deceased member upon his/her death; the members attend the wake for a special Prayer Service, and on the day of the Funeral, the Society escorts the deceased into and out of the church. We also say prayers at the Funeral Mass.

CCM (Confraternity of Christian Mothers), AND WOMEN'S GUILD

This organization started out as a group of Christian mothers who wanted to help the children who attended St. Mary's school and their families. Since the closing of the school, the group still supports events for the children of the Parish, but now welcomes ALL the women of the Parish, and also helps out wherever they are needed,. Some examples are providing an occasional after-funeral brunch, or the recent 70th birthday party for Sister Lisa.

They still host The Snowflake Festival for children and families in December, and hold a party after First Penance for the children, their parents and Grandparents. A major event organized by this group is the Annual Family Style Ham Dinner held each November which is both a fundraiser and social event for the Parish. ST. STANISLAUS, B&M, AND ST. CASIMIR SOCIETIES

The St. Stanislaus (Bishop & Martyr) Society was founded on June 25, 1905 and the St. Casimir Society was founded on March 5, 1911. They were independently organized as benevolent and protective civil organizations dedicated to the proposition that men practicing the Roman Catholic Faith have united in a brotherly way to assist each other in times of sickness and whenever there is a need. The Societies promote and protect the Catholic Faith through good works, charity and the promotion of Catholic Education. Members are to set good example by leading exemplary daily lives.

The two societies are separately incorporated under the laws of New York State, and are co-owners of the St. Stanislaus, B&M—St. Casimir Societies Cemetery Association, located on Wood Road, Whitesboro, NY. Both Societies are responsible for the management and operation of the cemetery which is governed by a Board of Directors comprised of elected officers from each Society.

HOLY NAME SOCIETY

The Holy Name Society is an organization of the men of the Parish whose purpose is to promote a greater devotion

And reverence to the Holy Name of Jesus, through word, actions and deeds; and to provide the opportunity for the men of the Parish, to grow stronger both spiritually, and morally by the sharing of their ideas, and themselves to attain that goal.

We are also a service organization dedicated to the ideal of promoting the welfare of the Parish and the youth of our Parish. This is achieved through various Society sponsored fund raisers such as our annual golf tournament, turkey raffle and ham raffle. Due to the tremendous support for these fund raisers, the Holy Name Society has funded and completed numerous projects throughout the Parish such as kitchen upgrades, various roof repairs and purchasing religious items for our youth.





WHY GO TO CHURCH??

A Church-goer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church on Sunday. "I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So I think I'm wasting my time, and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all.

This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the Editor. It went on for weeks until some wrote this: "I've been married for thirty years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of these meals. But I do know this. . . . They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise if I had not gone to church for nourishment I would be spiritually dead today!"

When you are down to nothing. . . God is UP to something! Faith sees the invisible, receives the impossible! Thank God for our physical AND our spiritual nourishment.









THE LIFE BENEFITS OF REGULAR CHURCH ATTENDANCE

What if I told you there was a well-researched and statistically proven program that can:

- increase the average life expectancy of your children by 8 years
- significantly reduce their use and risk from Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs
- dramatically lower their risk of suicide
- help them rebound from depression 70% faster
- dramatically reduce their risk for committing a crime
- improve their attitude at school and increase their school participation
- reduce their risk for rebelliousness
- reduce the likelihood that they would binge drink in college
- improve their odds for a "very happy" life

Is there such a program? Yes, there is. And it is supported by research from Duke University, Indiana University, The University of Michigan, The Center for Disease Control, Barna Research Group, and the National Institute for Healthcare Research.

How much would a program like this be worth to you? What if I told you it was free, and only took about 2 hours a week. Take a look at the list again. It's not a dream. The program is called "active church participation." In study, after study, after study, children who actively engage in a faith community on a regular basis are rewarded with SIGNIFICANTLY reduced likelihood of problems and risks, and significantly improved odds of a happier, healthier, longer life. These studies show the same results for adults as well.
